## ADVICE LETTER NO. 1231

## TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA

California-American Water Company (U210W) (California American Water) hereby submits for filing the following Tier 2 advice letter applicable to its Monterey County District as required by Decision (D.) 18-09-017.

## Purpose \& Background:

As directed by the California Public Utilities Commission ("Commission") in D.18-09-017, California American Water files this Tier 2 advice letter providing its assessment as to whether it intends to file an application with the Commission to pursue a Water Purchase Agreement ("WPA") for additional water supply in its Monterey District service area to be provided by an expansion of the Pure Water Monterey ("PWM") Project, which is being jointly developed by Monterey Peninsula Water Management District ("MPWMD") and Monterey One Water ("M1W"). (D.18-09-017, p. 214, Ordering Paragraph 37.) As discussed in more detail below, California American Water does not intend to file an application seeking approval of a PWM expansion WPA at this time.

In D.18-09-017, the Commission granted California American Water a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for the Monterey Peninsula Water Supply Project ("MPWSP"), as modified, with a desalination plant sized at 6.4 million gallons per day. In coming to its decision, Commission considered the possibility of expanding the PWM to provide water to California American Water's Monterey District customers, but concluded at the time that " $[\mathrm{t}] \mathrm{he}$ evidence in the record in this proceeding is not sufficient to convince us that PWM expansion is a viable alternative at this point." (D.18-09-017, p. 42.) The Commission further stated that it intends to consider the expansion of the PWM only to the extent that the desalination plant authorized in D.18-09-017 "is delayed to the point that sufficient source water capacity is more likely than not to be unavailable after the December 31, 2021, deadline set by the State Water Resources Control Board in its amended CDO." (D.18-09-017, p. 44.) Thus, a hypothetical expansion of the PWM would only supplement the authorized desalination plant on a temporary basis, rather than replace it.

Nonetheless, the Commission directed California American Water to continue to assess the possibility of expanding the PWM to further supply California American Water customers and "enter into negotiations with PWM as to the potential cost, schedule, and amount of water that could be supplied by PWM if cost effective to ratepayers." In accordance with the Commission's order, California American Water has commenced negotiations with MPWMD and M1W and has met with those public agencies on multiple occasions. On January 31, 2019, the principals for the three parties, including Richard Svindland and Ian Crooks for California American Water, David Stoldt for MPWMD, and Paul Sciuto for M1W, met to discuss PWM expansion. Mr. Svindland and Mr. Crooks have also had informal discussions with Mr. Stoldt and Mr. Sciuto regarding the project over the last several months.

The potential PWM expansion is still being developed and is not yet at a point where California American Water can determine whether it should be used to supply Monterey District customers. Indeed, California American Water only recently learned the projected (not actual) cost of the water for the initial PWM project, which is approximately $\$ 1,976$ per acre foot. The cost was originally estimated to be $\$ 1,720$ per acre foot. This amounts to an additional $\$ 896,000$ per year. For the expansion, the current estimate is $\$ 2,233$ per acre foot, which is an additional $\$ 5$ million per year, assuming 2250 acre feet. California American Water still does not know, however, whether the expansion project water will be available for temporary sale in the event it is needed. Specifically, with respect to the PWM expansion, California American Water does not have all of the necessary information regarding the sources of supply water, development costs, price of developed water, environmental effects, permitting requirements, water quality, sources of funding, and plans for related facilities. While initial estimates have been provided for the total project development, it is not clear how such costs would be shared by other purchasers of the water.

Moreover, the permitting and anticipated construction of the authorized MPWSP desalination plant has been and is currently proceeding according to schedule, and as such there is no reason to believe that there will be a delay in the MPWSP desalination plant coming online before December 31, 2021. Therefore, there is no need to file an application at this time, even if sufficient information were available.

California American Water remains committed to working with the Monterey community to provide reliable and efficient water service. California American Water has pledged to assist with the cost of the environmental review of the expanded PWM EIR and will continue to discuss PWM expansion with MPWMD and M1W as the project develops. ${ }^{1}$ If a temporary, supplemental water supply becomes necessary and can be cost-effectively supplied by PWM expansion, California American Water will seek Commission approval of a WPA.

(5) The relief requested in the advice letter requires consideration in a formal hearing, or is otherwise inappropriate for the advice letter process; or
(6) The relief requested in the advice letter is unjust, unreasonable, or discriminatory (provided that such a protest may not be made where it would require relitigating a prior order of the Commission).

A protest may not rely on policy objections to an AL where the relief requested in the AL follows rules or directions established by statute or Commission order applicable to the utility. A protest shall provide citations or proofs where available to allow staff to properly consider the protest.
